Dear friends.

Even if you have not listened particularly carefully to the readings which have just been proclaimed, you should still be able to pick up that *love* features very heavily in these readings. Nine times it is mentioned in the Gospel, and nine times in the second reading.

Central to this treatise on *love* are the words of Jesus in the Gospel: *Love one another as I have loved you*. Like some of the scriptural readings we have heard during this season of Easter, it sounds like an unreal and impossible request. First it was the early Christian living in harmony and sharing all that they had in common. Now, we must love others as Jesus has loved us. But we ask the question, How do I do this? I don't even like some people, how on earth am I meant to love them? Jesus never asks us to do something without showing us the way to do it. How does he show us the way?

The Second Reading today reminds us that God is love. So, to go about loving as Jesus did, we must remember, first and foremost, that God is the source of love. Next, we are called to keep the commandments. Now, is this keeping a set of laws, or living by the rule of the Gospel? No, the commandment of the Gospel is the commandment to love. And if it is still unclear, Jesus gives one more example: you can have no greater love than to lay down your life for your friends. More of this unreal Easter stuff? Sounds like it, doesn't it? Until we remember that Jesus did exactly that – gave up his life for those he loved – his friends. And that is what we now are precisely because Jesus did lay down his life for us. His friends. Friendship implies equality. Through his death and resurrection, we are brought into a new relationship with Jesus. As friends. We are no longer servants.

This relationship of friends, however, carries with it an obligation. Because we are now friends of the Master – because we know his business - we have a mission. And our mission - should we chose to accept it - is to go and bear fruit - to pass the Good News of Salvation on to others. For to claim the name *Christian*, is to be a missionary. To proclaim this good news of salvation to others.

I don't know whether any of you have seen the slogan *WWJD*. I think it comes from some of the Protestant Pentecostal-type Churches in America, and can be found on jewellery, on bookmarks, coffee mugs, probably even on boxer shorts. WWJD stands for What Would Jesus Do. I suppose the idea behind this slogan is a good one: by having the letters WWJD in front of our eyes all the time, it is a reminder of being a Christian. But I think people who have **WWID** jewellery, coffee mugs etc have missed the point. In some senses, it is no good asking what would Jesus do. Because Jesus is not here. We are. In this season of Easter, we are reminded of our Baptism. We are baptised into the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. We are called to be the Christ in the world today. So, it is no good asking What Would Jesus Do? We know what he did. The question is what will we do? And Jesus has given us the answer: love one another as I have loved you.



Readings at Mass The Sixth Sunday of Easter, Year B — 5th May 2024

First Reading: Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48 A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

The gift of the Holy Spirit was poured out upon the gentiles also.

As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up', he said 'I am only a man after all!'

Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.'

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.

A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you. I shall not call you servants any more, because a servant does not know his master's business; I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. You did not choose me, no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last; and then the Father will give you anything you ask in my name. What I command you is to love one another.'
