Dear friends.

This is a great and holy day for us because it is the day when the Church celebrates the feast of our parish patroness, St Monica. Why does the Church celebrate as a saint, a woman who lived over sixteen hundred years ago? The Church still remembers St Monica because even now, sixteen hundred years after her death, her life teaches us two very important things.

Firstly, St Monica teaches us the virtue of patience as a Christian. Monica was indeed a holy woman. But, her husband, and his family were not Christians. And her son, Augustine, didn't lead a very Christian life, either. But this did not discourage Monica. She was constant in her prayer for her husband and for her son, Augustine to become Christians. In the case of her son Augustine, this took over thirty years! Today, we tend to want things to happen instantly. St Monica teaches us what it means to be patient, especially in our prayer.

St Monica also teaches us to have faith in God and to grow close to God. On the journey back from Italy, to her home in Africa after Augustine had become a Christian, Monica, Augustine and one of his brothers had stopped to rest along the way. As they stopped, Monica became unwell. She was in fact dying. Her other son said that he wished Monica would survive until they got home to Africa. Monica thought differently. She said, "Lay this body wherever it may be. Let no care of it disturb you: this only I ask of you that you should remember me at the altar of the Lord wherever you may be."

Monica had faith that when she died, not much else mattered. Monica believed that when she died, she would be with God forever. So whether she died in Italy or at home in Africa didn't really matter. What mattered was her life with God. All she wanted was for people to pray for her. And this is what should matter with us. Our life with God.

This is what makes this a holy and great day for us. Because St Monica, even sixteen hundred years after her death, can still teach us that what is important is patience and our life with God.

St Monica, Pray for us!





READINGS FOR THE NEXT SUNDAY

23RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Readings for next Sunday 4 September for Parishioners to make some time during the week to read and reflect on.

FIRST READING | WISDOM 9:13-18

What man can know the intentions of God?
Who can divine the will of the Lord?
The reasonings of mortals are unsure
and our intentions unstable;
for a perishable body presses down the soul,
and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind.
It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth,
laborious to know what lies within our reach;
who, then, can discover what is in the heavens?
As for your intention, who could have learnt it,
had you not granted Wisdom
and sent your holy spirit from above?
Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened
and men been taught what pleases you,
and saved, by Wisdom.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

R. In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge.

You turn men back in to dust and say: 'Go back, sons of men.'
To your eyes a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night. *R.*

You sweep men away like a dream, like grass which springs up in the morning. In the morning it springs up and flowers: by evening it withers and fades. *R*.

Make us know the shortness of our life that we may gain wisdom of heart. Lord, relent! Is your anger for ever? Show pity to your servants. *R*.

In the morning, fill us with your love; we shall exult and rejoice all our days. Let the favour of the Lord be upon us: give success to the work of our hands. *R*.

SECOND READING | Philemon 9-10, 12-17

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you,

and with him – I could say – a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a bloodbrother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! Let your face shine on your servant, and teach me your laws. Alleluia!

GOSPEL | Luke 14:25-33

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes, and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.' .'
