Dear friends.

In Sacred Scripture, the wind and storm are often seen as forces of evil and chaos which only God can control. But the storm can also stand for the trials and tribulations which the righteous person suffers, and from which only the power of God can save them.

In today's Gospel, as Jesus and his apostles were crossing the lake, a storm blows up. For a while, the apostles were managing. They were in control – even if only barely. It's a good feeling to be in control. We feel as if we are running the show. That things are within our power. That the outcome is in our own hands.

At times like this, it is easy to convince ourselves that we have faith, even great faith. But we could simply be on an ego trip. We are happiest when in we are in control of a familiar and predictable world. When we are setting the agenda. When we create our own goals. Sometimes it means controlling lives of others too. We don't really need God, except maybe to give us a pat on the back at the end of it all.

But that evening when the storm arose, and the boat seemed to be on the verge of sinking, the apostles suddenly discovered that things were out of their control. Things were beyond their power. The outcome was out of their hands.

To find ourselves in such a situation is both humbling and terrifying. But it precisely at times like this that we discover whether or not we have faith. Our first reaction is to think that God no longer cares about us, and has abandoned us.

When things got out of control for the apostles it seems that they too felt like this. They looked towards Jesus only to discover that he was asleep. But the ability to sleep peacefully in the midst of a storm is a sign of peaceful and complete trust in God. This deep faith of Jesus contrasts with the *little faith* of the apostles. Jesus indeed chides the apostles for their lack of trust, and then he calms the storm.

For the early Church, this miracle was a relevant one. The boat represented the Church, and the storm represented the persecutions unleashed on the Church by evil powers that wanted to destroy it. The early Church was filled with fear. To them it *must* have seemed as if Jesus was asleep. But then their faith rose to the challenge. It was enough for them to *awaken* Jesus with their prayers: to have faith and trust once more in his presence, for the storm of their fear to be stilled.

Even though Jesus was with the apostles in that boat, the storm still struck. Just because a storm does strikes does not mean that God has abandoned us. If we have faith we will not doubt that he is with us. We turn to him in prayer: we know his help.

Today's Gospel challenges us to trust in God's power, especially when storms assail us. Because no matter what storms threaten to overwhelm us, we know that for we who believe, it is rather the love of God which overwhelms us. And then, we give up the need to ever be in control.
